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

CHALLENGE

Our challenge this month was hollow forms (any size) and we had some beautiful and unique pieces in the novice and advanced categories.

Bill Loitz contributed a small hollow form of bleached ash which was sandblasted and has an ebony ring. His second piece was manzanita root burl finished with Maloof Poly Oil.



Sandy Huse decided to challenge herself with a "Fun House" and a "Trojan" turning. Each is made of oak, wire, beads and little people to bring the piece to life.



Scott Johnston turned a hollow vessel out of green wood which was stained black and coated with liquid copper and gold texture. It was then painted inside to give the illusion of an old

metal pot.

Jim Hurst brought 2 pieces for the challenge.

One was made of Tipuana Tipu, dyed blue and finished with CA glue. He also turned a tall vase out of ash and finished with sanding sealer, woodturning finish and Beal Buffing.



Ron Shaffer used wood burning and texturing with a high speed carver to decorate his hollow form.



Henry Koch made a miniature using dyed blue maple and textured with pyrography. Then he turned a lid so this would also fit the category of a box.



The winner in the Beginners Category was **Ron Shaffer** who “went the extra mile” with texturing, and in the Advanced Category **Bill Loitz** won with his nicely finished burl piece.

SHOW AND TELL



Ron Clark turned an inlay bowl from pepper tree wood and alabaster inlay. It was finished with CA and Mylands.

Jim Hurst glued together two 4x8” pieces of Douglas fir to turn this vase. He used a skew and then couldn’t get the marks out, so he sandblasted and dyed it, and then used lacquer finish.



Carey Caires turned a goblet out of laminated maple. It is finished with Mylands and wax.

Thomas Cassidy turned a platter made of maple with cracks in it. The finish is Maloof oil.



Jim Schopper’s bowl is made of unknown wood. The exterior finish is Mylands Friction Polish

and the interior is finished with Salad Bowl Finish.

Nick Tuzzolino brought a bowl he made of Norfolk pine with a lacquer finish.



Steve Cassidy turned a hollow form but we cannot find a write-up or picture. However the important information he gave us was a suggestion. He suggested that the GWG consider a program to help others, such as military vets. There is an interesting article in the recent AAW magazine about the San Diego Woodturners Chapter and their work, which inspired him to consider what we might also do.

Charlie Hulien made a paper towel holder with threads cut using a router. He also brought a lint roller. He is selling these practical items at craft fairs.



Ken Sutton made a lidded box with a finial out of maple and finished with wax.



Justin Baetz used magnolia to turn this bowl which he sanded to 2000 grit and then finished



with micro mesh and bees wax.



Deb Sigel gave a very informative presentation about mixed media additions to wood working. She talks very fast and gave us a lot of information, but she will post her power point on the GWG website so we can take time to read it. Each slide contains lots of ideas – as **Deb** said, there's lots of writing – so there are details about

the subjects she covered. Basically she talked about non-wood materials such as shells, stones, beads, plumbing pipe, wire, copper pipe and more. She talked about integrating soldered metals with rivets and riveting through wood. And she talked about soldering copper, brass and silver and the importance of using boric acid. When you read her power point on the GWG website, you will also find links to websites she uses for materials and books she recommends. This was an excellent talk with so much helpful information!
