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

CHALLENGE

There was a really good turnout for the platters, plates and saucers challenge. The judges were **Paul Schmit** and **Dan Hogan** and **Cal Elshoff**.

In the Novice category we had several entries. The first was from **Steve Dunn** who, according to our challenge rules, is really in this category. He had a fine Ash platter that was finished with Deft.



The winner in the category was **Steve Veenstra** with his Mahogany square edge plate with an oil salad bowl finish.



In the Intermediate Category we had two entries from **Ralph Chamlee**. The first was a six inch saucer turned from redwood. It was dyed and had wonderful carving around the rim.



Ralphs' second entry was the category winner. It was a 12" platter turned from Oregon Myrtle that had inlaid green stone around the rim along with a carved and stippled ribbon.



Paul Schmit also brought in two entries. The first was a cocobolo dish finished with tung oil. His second entry was a 3 piece set of maple platters with a simple sanding sealer and wax.



Robert Manning brought in an African Mahogany saucer with a turquoise accent band around the rim.



In the Advanced category we had two entries from **Bill Noble**. The first was a Monterey Cyprus platter and the second was a Ficus plate, both were finished with lacquer.



Terrell Hasker brought in a bunch of plates and platters; he said he had a little time on his hands this past week so he got busy at the lathe. They

were turned from Ash and Flowering Pear with no finish yet. Here is the stack.



Jim O'Connor used Ash to turn a nice large platter that he very nicely decorated. That may be more time on the decoration than on the turning!



Our VP **Frank Guarino** brought in a beautiful nested set of plates turned from York Gum Burl. They had a Danish oil and carnauba wax finish.



Pete Carta brought in two entries. His first was a platter turned from Bubinga and the second was a plate turned from Ash with gilding crème.



Queen Carey Caires brought an homage to Jimmy Clews with her mini platter. It was turned from Thuya Burl then colored and gold leaf was applied to the center and finished with lacquer.

Al Falck brought in two nice pieces. The first was a cracker and cheese platter turned from Cocobolo and maple and the second was a cup and saucer turned from Carolina Cherry. Both had lacquer as a final finish.

And the winner in the Advanced category was **Jack Wooddell** with his nicely done Eucalyptus platter with a wipe on polyurethane finish.



SHOW AND TELL

There were lots of turnings for show and tell this month. First off was **Mark Fitzsimmons** who brought a very large walnut and Manzanita hollow form with oak dovetails tying it together. It was sandblasted and had a polyurethane finish.



Ralph Chamlee brought in a 10 inch platter with a carved lace cover turned from Oregon Myrtle with a sealer and lacquer finish.



And **Dan Hogan** brought in an oak tray finished with lacquer and beeswax. That's nice carving work Dan!



Cal Elshoff brought in a Grecian style bowl turned out of Poplar with a lacquer finish. His second piece was a 6 inch black acacia and ash bowl. Both were creative forms.



Al Miller brought in an Amboyna Burl and Blackwood lidded box finished with tung oil.



Al Falck brought in a bowl turned from cocobolo with an African Blackwood rim. It was finished with tung oil, boiled linseed oil and urethane.

PRESENTATION

Queen Carey Caires brought in two bottle stoppers she made for a wedding gift. They are made from ebony and spalted maple.



Steve Dunn brought in two mini cowboy hats and two natural edge mushrooms.



Pete Carta brought in a great African Blackwood lidded box with hand chased threads and no finish was needed.



And Jim O'Connor brought in a full sized cowboy hat out of Brazilian Pepperwood on a really appropriate hat stand.



The presentation this month was given by **Dick Lukes** and it was all about photographing your work. This is something that comes up frequently in woodturning as many

venues require pictures of what we have done. Do you want to enter a juried show or compete in the AAW Forum Contest or maybe have a gallery exhibit your work? They all want photographs and now especially they want digital photographs or JPG files. So Dick set out to try and explain the basics of how to do this. If you are going to go the digital route then get a camera with 1) at least 3 megapixels or better of resolution 2) a zoom lens that includes a focal length in the range of 80 to 120 millimeters 3) settings other than manual 4) a spot on the bottom to attach a tripod 5) manual focus as an option 6) exposure control 7) the ability to use a cable release. So now that you have the camera what next? You should get a seamless background in white, grey or black. Dick recommended paper instead of cloth so wrinkles will not detract from your work. You can get them at a camera store or large pieces of paper at an art supply store. If you really want to look sharp then get one that is graduated light to dark. Next you need lighting. Avoid direct sunlight or direct on-camera flash because this light is too harsh. If you are outside then diffuse the light. And a tip is do not leave your work piece to sit directly exposed to sunlight or a high level of heat it can crack your finished piece! You can use halogen bulbs or 3200 Kelvin photo floods available at good camera stores as well as the stands and reflectors to hold them. A plain colorless shower curtain can be stretched over a simple frame of PVC pipe with your seamless paper attached at

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the back to form a smooth curve coming forward. Place your work on the seamless and direct light through the shower curtain and you will have a great set-up. Now place your camera just high enough to show the top rim of a vessel and a little of the inside so you can see that it has depth. Fill the frame with your piece; you want all of the detail you can get. Find "the best side" of your piece. That means the best grain pattern or your finest decoration matters! You worked hard on this so show it off. Focus at 1/3rd of the distance back from the front surface of the work so that the depth of field will make it sharp from front to back. Now just press the shutter release and away you go. Here is the raw or before image of Jim's cowboy hat so you can see all of the background and surrounding clutter.
