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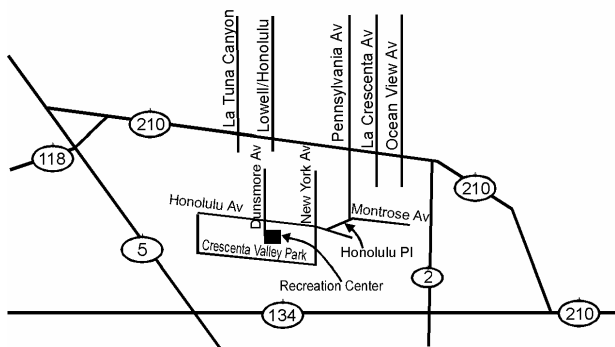

And Java DeLaura showed up with her seven-month-old bundle of joy. She introduced her as our youngest member. No wonder she's been absent for awhile!

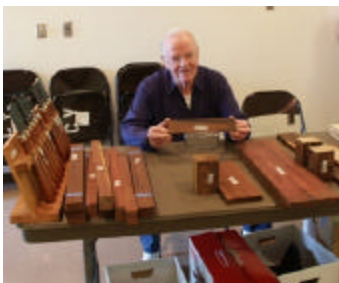


We once again had a huge wood raffle. Special thanks go to Ralph Otte, Floyd Pederson and Bob Stone for collecting and hauling all that wood.

Challenge

The Challenge this month was to turn a rolling pin or spoons. We saw fabulous spoons, some with carved decorations and some with antlers for handles. Ed Hotchkin and Bob DeVoe had a difficult job as judges, but they chose the following winners:

Novice – Dave Ellis

Intermediate – Earleen Ahrens

Advanced – Don Comer

Show and Tell



Don Comer made three spoons for the challenge. His beautifully carved spoon won for the Advanced Category.

Earlene made whimsical spoons with antlers for handles. She used spalted maple, maple and elm. One was specifically for pouring because it dropped and a piece conveniently broke off on the end. Each spoon is beautiful and Earlene won the Intermediate Category for her work.



Bob Ulrich brought in a nice, smooth rolling pin. He didn't indicate the type of wood, but the grain was lovely.



Dave Ellis turned an exquisite trivet on 17 centers. He used walnut and maple wood, and he won in the Novice Category for his perfect work.

In honor of Easter, Jim O'Connor turned a bowl full of eggs. They were perfectly shaped and finished to a nice shine.



We can learn to turn them, too, by attending the demonstration by Dick Sing on May 6th. And Jim turned another cowboy hat to add to his collection. This is made of oak. Jim is a master of cowboy hats now!



Joe Devanny used silky oak and glass nuggets to make this stunning platter.

Bob Fahrnbruch showed a mesquite bowl. He got the wood from a dump in a State Park near Phoenix and he had to buy a saw to get it the right size to bring home. But this bowl is worth the effort. What beautiful grain!

Cal Elshoff shows us his square cocobolo platter. He also brought a natural edge maple burl bowl and a plaque he created for Habitat for Humanity. Cal does perfect work!



Bill Haskell brought in a hollow vessel with a carved oval opening. It was made from virgin yellow birch, and he researched this wood so he could tell us that it came from the bottom of Lake Superior where it lay for 150 years. Bill also showed an enclosed bowl form with angled routed line design. Fabulous!



Dave Ellis made a spoon, spatula and spreading knife from poplar. The finish was so impressive, maybe because he used the Beale buff.

Ralph Otte showed two segmented bowls. This one is ash, bubinga and holly. His work is done perfectly.



If it's not smaller than a penny, it's not made by Carey. Her heart shaped spoon is made of pink ivory and the little spoon is made from a pen blank. Carey says it's a

sugar spoon for someone on a diet! They are both well made.

Pete Carta brought in a mini cowboy hat made of liquid amber. Like Jim O'Connor, Pete is very skilled at making hats. And Pete also made two tea scoops and a "kiwi scoop." Ask him about that one!

John Doyle also brought in a tea scoop which is beautiful, but he didn't know the wood. He also brought two nicely made rolling pins.

I wish I had a photo of Joe Larsson's "Love Spoon" with three hearts on the handle. How sweet and romantic!



Ray Ford has been busy. He showed a "Red Ripple" bowl from redwood which he stacked. Everyone loved it! He also showed

his "Crazy Quilt hollow vessel, a butterfly goblet, a deep bowl titled "Arboretum" with leaves burned in the background and a great bowl with a carved leaf applied on the front.

Bill Nelson brought in an exquisite spiral goblet made of blackwood, boxwood and pink ivory. He will send it to the California Contours Show and many people will be admiring it.

Al Falck showed four spoons, one of which had a great shape, and I think he called it a jelly spoon. It was beautiful! He also turned a segmented vase made of oak, pine and maple. Al does perfect work.

Floyd Pederson showed a two segmented bowls. One was made of walnut and zebrawood, and the other was walnut, maple and bloodwood.

Terrell Hasker arrived a bit late so we missed getting a photo taken of his work. He brought an oak spoon and an "Oops!" Oops happens to everyone. Terrell does great work.
