Show and Tell



There was no regular Show and Tell this month. In its place we had Ray Leier, who graciously evaluated pieces submitted by the membership and discussed the principles of good design as they apply to wood art from the viewpoint of an upscale gallery owner who has to be able to defend his choice of pieces to his customers.

Ray examined every aspect of each piece that he evaluated, holding it up above his head to view the bottom and looking down on it. He commented on the workmanship and the finish. He was careful not to use words like “good” or “bad” but instead to comment on what he, as a potential buyer, thought “worked

well” (or didn’t work) in the context of the implicit objective of the artist.

The photos below show some of the pieces Ray chose to examine, and his method of examination. Most aren’t identified because without having a photo of the artist in close proximity to the piece, I couldn’t tell who did what except in a few instances.




Upcoming Events (Continued)

The Binh Pho Demonstration

The first demonstration for 2004 will be by Binh Pho on Saturday, February 7. Because of the likelihood of cold weather, we will be holding it inside the Crescenta Valley Park building. The Sleepy Hollow Woodcarvers have agreed to share the room with us so a little bit of cooperation may be in order. But, at least we won't have that cold, icy wind blowing over the fence on us.


Binh plans a long day for us that will include turning, piercing and coloring of his signature hollow vessels. He has some techniques for turning very thin walled (one sixteenth inch) hollow vessels that are unusual and may be useful to those of us who have the nerve to try turning a vessel approaching that wall thickness. He will show us how he decorates his vessels by painting a colorful scene and emphasizing it with a delicately carved filigree pattern. He uses masking and airbrushing to do the painting and carves the filigree by piercing the vessel wall with a very high-speed carving tool. I'm sure we all will have an interesting, informative day.

By the way, lunch will be served. Jackie says that even though she won't be First Lady anymore, she will still be "Chief cook and bottle washer" for this demo.
