

CHALLENGE

We had a huge turnout for the challenge of Beads of Courage boxes. There were no separate categories or gift certificates awarded this time. They were all winners! So I will just present each box as it was placed on the display table. We lead off with **Earleen Ahrens** and her

“Minion Box”. It was hand painted and finished with acrylic.



Next was **Thomas Cassidy** and his Beech and Walnut box. It was finished with Maloof oil.



John Janssen had three boxes made from mystery wood, John gave his boxes to President Bill Loitz to bring in so there was no wood or finish information available.



Steve Auer brought in a box turned from figured Maple with an Ironwood lid. It was finished with friction polish.



Mike Toth brought in box turned from Norfolk Island Pine and finished with Tung oil and wax.



Craig Sobel brought in a box turned from wood that was purchased at the auction we had at Don Comer's home. It appears to be Canarywood with a Maple lid.

Henry Koch brought in a box turned from Eucalyptus with a Mahogany lid. It was finished with *Wood Turners Bowl Finish*. He also had a Melaleuca box finished with Acrylic spray.



Carey Caires turned a box with a base out of figured Maple. The finial was Dymondwood and it was finished with Walnut oil.



Vice President **Steve Cassidy** brought in a box turned from Maple and Walnut. It was finished with *Briwax*.



President **Bill Loitz** brought in three boxes turned from Beech a Walnut. It was finished with poly oil.



Pete Carta brought in a box turned from Ash and finished with oil.



James Hurst brought in a box turned from Ash with a Wenge lid and a metal drawer pull as a finial. It was finished with *Behlens Woodturners Finish* and then buffed.

Bob Clark brought in a segmented box turned from Maple with green inserts.



Dave Hergesheimer brought in three segmented boxes turned out of Maple and Walnut. His finials were a toy train and toy cars.



Lou Hansen brought in three segmented boxes turned from Purpleheart, Maple, Sycamore, Bloodwood, Yellowheart and Walnut. They all had Buckeye finials and a lacquer finish.



Nick Tuzzolino showed off his wood working skills this time instead of wood turning skills. These boxes were made from Maple with Purpleheart lids, Ebony finials and Padouk keys.



John Fisher gave us presentation on making and using long lamp augers. He explained that these tools cut with the edge not the center. There are several sources for readymade ones. Craft Supply has one for about \$63. Packard has one for about \$68. According to **John** you



can get an unhandled one for about \$15 and then use your Vicegrips to hold on to it. The key to boring out the hole is low speed and clearing out the chips frequently. **John** had several examples of augers both bought and made by himself that he offered to members to try. We look forward to hearing about their results.
