

CHALLENGE

We had a good turnout for the challenge of plates, platters or saucers. There were enough entries to fill out each category. In the novice category we started off with **Norm Leduc** and his "not quite finished" platter of what he called Mahogany but it really looked more like Ash. It had a wax finish.



Next up was **Alan Pepper** and his Sapele platter. It was finished with oil.



And the winner in the category was new member **Kim Acuna** with her first platter turned out of

Maple on a handmade Walnut stand. It has no finish yet.



In the Intermediate category we started off with **Lou Hanson** and his segmented platter turned from Buckeye, Maple and Purpleheart. It had a lacquer finish.



Bob Clark brought in two platters that had been laser engraved and turned out of Maple. The first was for a 40th wedding anniversary and the second was for a 50th wedding anniversary. Both were finished with *Minwax Antique Oil*.



Charlie Hulien also brought in two platters. Both were turned out of White oak and Wenge and then finished with Charlies' special finish of 1/3

boiled linseed oil, 1/3 marine spar varnish and 1/3 turpentine. Then a coat of wax was applied. He is not sure which is ying and which is yang.



Kathy Hein brought in a plate turned from Walnut and finished with *Good Stuff*.



And the winner in the category was **Ron Shaffer** with his Maple platter. It had a wood burned rim that was colored with acrylic paint and copper guilders wax. It was finished with Danish Oil.



In the Advanced category we started off with **Bill Haskell** who brought in three plates all turned out of Tiger striped Maple and finished with lacquer. The first was a graduation plate with a picture of the graduate in the center. The second was a

memorial plate with a brass photo engraved insert in the middle.



The third was an anniversary plate with a picture of the happy couple in the center.



Craig Sobel brought in a very creative segmented saucer jewelry box turned out of Maple, Ebony and Bubinga.



And here it is all opened up.



The winner in the category was **Nick Tuzzolino** with his Ash platter. It had a purple dyed rim and was finished with Teak oil.



Bill also brought in an interesting new form of a cross. The first was turned out of Douglas fir and the second out of Walnut. Both were finished with lacquer. (Note: The camera is tilted not the forms.)



SHOW AND TELL

There were quite a few items in the show and tell this month. We started off with **Floyd Pedersen** and his Ash vase with a shellac finish.



Vice President **Steve Cassidy** brought two items. The first was a lidded box turned out of spalted mystery wood finished with Briwax on the interior and lacquer on the exterior. The second was a letter opener turned out of Carob and finished with lacquer.



Bill Haskell brought in a vase form turned out of Carob. He bleached the sapwood rim and then pierced it and bleached it again. It was finished with lacquer.



Kim Acuna brought a bowl turned out of Apple and finished with boiled linseed oil and varnish.



Jack Stumph brought in two platters both turned from Lacy Maple and finished with lacquer.



Ron Shaffer brought in three pendants that he made with an off center hole. They were made from Cocobolo, Tigerwood and SpectraPly. They were all finished with friction polish.



Bob Clark brought in a pod form turned from Purpleheart with a pyrography ribbon around the top. He also brought in a hollow form turned from Maple with a natural edge and also some pyrography designs. Both were finished with wax.



We finished up with **Carey Caires** and two bottle stoppers that she gave to **Floyd** for the Kiwanis event in October. They were turned from Maple and Walnut and finished with Mylands wax.
