Bill Haskell's "Small Bang" was turned, carved and wood-burned from iron bark eucalyptus, with black dye and iridescent acrylic.



Craig Sobel's Yellow Brick Road was finished with lacquer.



Mike Toth had a set of stacking bowls created for a young relative. Maple, walnut oil.



Mark Fitzsimmons presented a 22 inch tall Art Deco Rocket. Pine, water base polyurethane.



Allan Knutson's Norfolk Island Pine vessel was finished with clear Krylon spray.



Surya's bowls (carob, birch, ash) had Tried & True, epoxy w/mica powder.



Mike Toth had 3 bowls, no information supplied.



James Hurst's vase turned into a sort of hollow form. Unknown wood, lacquer finish.



Klaus Schmitt gave us a sycamore bowl and a eucalyptus lidded vessel, lacquer finish on both.



Carl Haney turned a vessel from Paralam beam material and black walnut. Poly finish.



Bob Clark had a walnut bowl with oil finish, and some pens, CA finish.



Surya made some drop spindles (for spinning yarn) made of poplar, persimmon, walnut, T&T finish




Mark Fitzsimmons' 3 footed vessel (that's three feet to stand on, not 3 foot big!) was made from live oak (*quercus agrifolia*) with water based polyurethane finish.



PRESENTATION



Our Presentation for February was by **Bill Loitz** on *Sharpening*. He brought in his rolling sharpening station with several grinders & buffers. He has CBN and stone wheels on various grinders, and uses the Oneway Wolverine jig system for a lot of the tasks. He uses platform grinding for spindle roughing gouges, skews and scrapers, and the jig's arm and Vari-grind attachment for gouges. Several people had brought in tools, and he showed how to sharpen those, along with discussing various approaches to the sharpening process.
