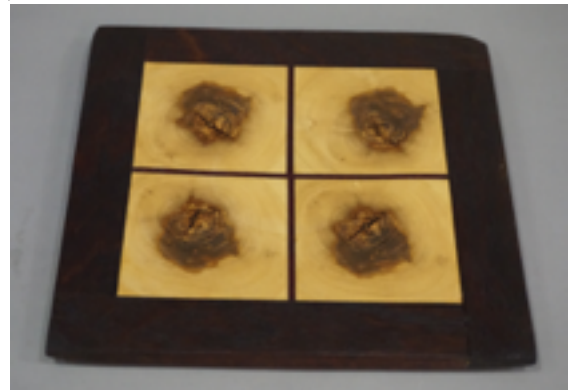
CHALLENGE

The June challenge was **Plates, Platters & Saucers**. We had entries in all categories this time.

The winner in the Beginner category was **Don Gustavson** with his plate of maple, various laminates and acrylic paint finished with tung oil and spar varnish.



Carl Christensen won in the Intermediate category with his square platter made from apricot limbs, finished with Maloof's



Top honors in the Advanced category were taken by **Ron Shaffer** with his redwood burl platter finished with Mahoney's walnut oil & wax.



Other entries:

Don Gustavson had a saucer of figured makore decorated with gold leaf and acrylic paint, spar varnish & tung oil as finish. **Carl Christensen** had a platter of unknown wood finished with Maloof's



Jim Schopper had two platters the first of unknown wood finished with walnut oil, the next of walnut finished with Mahoney's. He also had a saucer of masur birch finished with lacquer. **Joanie Cole** had an ebonized oak "platterish, platish, bowlish" piece.



Joel Jaffe had platters of white oak and myrtle, both finished with oil and wax.



Henry Koch had a walnut plate finished with walnut oil, and **Anton Bosch** a big leaf maple platter finished with Danish oil & poly.



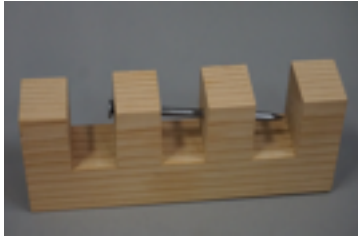
Dale Gertsch had a walnut plate finished with Mahoney oil, and **Scott Johnston** an alder platter with raw umber glaze & satin lacquer.



Judges were **Bob Wohlers**, **Andy Sway** and **Susan Libicki**.

SHOW AND TELL

Charlie Hulien had a beer stein of teak and walnut finished with salad bowl finish. He also had a “puzzle” piece. of pine and a nail.



Jim Schopper had a couple items - a walnut bowl with chain saw embellishment and an olive vase that had carving and pyrography, finished with Majoney's Oil.



Joanie Cole had a bowl of mystery raffle wood, while **Bob Clark** had a “learning experience” vessel of walnut, honey locust, Jatoba and elm, finished with wax and oil.



Nick Tuzzolino had an early start on his Bows of Courage entries, while **Dale Gertsch** had a walnut spoon and the jig used to make it.



Thomas Cassidy presented a walnut candlestick and a live edge bowl with texturing made from “FIBS” (found in Bill's shop) wood. Walnut oil was used to finish both.



Henry Koch had a teak plate finished with teak oil, and a Melaluca bowl with silver leaf, dyes & lacquer.

This was a program he purchased at the Portland Symposium and used to create his "learning experience" piece. There are 4 programs available from the owner (Lloyd Johnson): *Woodturner PRO*, *Segment PRO*, *Lamination PRO* and *3-D Design PRO*. They are only for the Windows platform (no Mac). Bob talked about some of his experiences with using the program, and also had some of the jigs and fixtures he used. One useful tip he had was using his cole jaws to turn the glued-up rings flat rather than sanding the glue off.
