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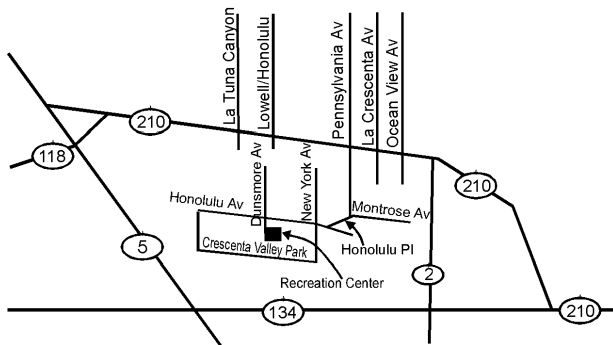

Meetings consist of announcements, a feature presentation, a Challenge, Show & Tell and a wood raffle (except for December).

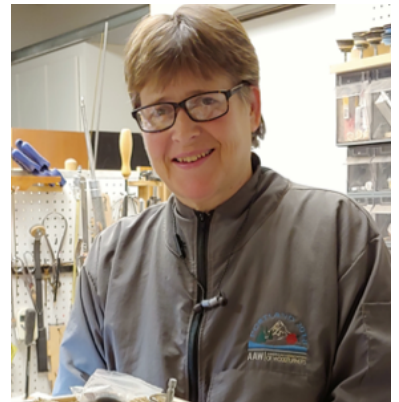

CHALLENGE

We had just enough entries for each category in the Candle holder challenge last month. In the Beginning category we had **Nicholas Eberhard** with his turned and carved entry. It was a hollowed out barley twist turned from East Indian Rosewood and finished with Danish Oil.



The winner in the category was **Mark Marion** who brought in a very nicely turned entry out of Cherry and finished with Tung oil and wax.



In the Intermediate category **Amos Schwarz** brought in matching candle holders turned out of Olive and finished with General Finishes.



In the Advanced category **Carey Caires** brought in a “large” candlestick turned out of Ebony topped with a “birthday candle”. It was finished with Walnut oil.



The winner in the category was **Chris Dodson** with his inside out candle holder. It was turned from Walnut and finished with wipe on Poly.



Next was **Sandy Huse** and what she titled “Baby’s First Nightlight: Fishy, Fishy.” It was made from a gourd with turned wood legs, glass, wire, fiber optic cable and a battery pack.



The winner in the category was **Jim Schopper** candle holder turned from Olive with a spun aluminum cup. It was finished with Belhem black dye and lacquer.



SHOW AND TELL

There were a good number of items in the show and tell this month. We started off with **Bob Clark** who brought in several turnings. The first was a Zebrawood platter finished with oil.



The second was a set of three teleidoscopes turned from Spectra ply and finished with CA glue



The third item was an East Indian Rosewood yo-yo also finished with CA glue.



Steve Veenstra brought in a huge 21" platter turned from assorted wood and resin. It was finished with lacquer.



Klaas Volbeda brought in what he called a random segmented vase. It was turned from Alder, Beech, Cherry, Maple, Tulip Poplar and Walnut. It was finished with Watco wipe on poly.



Chris Dodson brought in a very clever French Horn mouth piece holder that he turned as a gift for a musician friend. It was turned from Ash, Poplar and Cocobolo and finished with wipe on poly



James Hurst brought in a cup turned from Eucalyptus that had a textured ribbon that was then painted with acrylic paint and finished with lacquer.



Amos Schwarz brought in an **Eli Avisera** designed candle holder turned from mystery wood with a forgotten finish.



We finished up with **Anton Bosch** who brought in a tall standard lamp turned from Cypress. It was stained, dyed and finished with polyurethane.



Bill Loitz brought in a 13" salad bowl turned from Ash. It was decorated with acrylic paint and Guilder's paste and finished with Mahoney walnut oil.



PRESENTATION

The presentation this month was given by **Bob Clark** and it was all about the September

challenge of Beads of Courage boxes, This, will be the 4th year we will be participating in this worthwhile project.

Bob passed out the ID card and the beads for all that wanted them.

Recommended interior dimensions for turned boxes

are: 6" diameter (5" minimum), 5" height (4" minimum), Recommended dimensions for flatwork boxes are 4" x 6" x 4". Lids should be easy for small or ill children to remove or lift.

Finishing of boxes is extremely important! Beads of Courage members who receive these boxes are susceptible to germs/infections/mold. Bowls that have not been properly sealed can harbor mold. Please take the time to ensure you are using a safe finishing process that does not contain toxic materials. Also do not use finishes like linseed oil that take a long time to outgas.

All kinds of wood are beautiful! Please refrain from painting Beads of Courage boxes. Instead, highlight the beauty of the wood with clear varnish, a stain, and/or burning.

Bob DeVoe - a GWG Treasure

BOB DEVOE – A GWG TREASURE

Bob DeVoe, who turned 89 in April, has been a real treasure for the Glendale Woodturners Guild, a chapter of the American Association of Woodturners. He was there at the chapter's beginning when he attended the first GWG meeting in June 1993. He became treasurer in 1997 and held that position until early in 2019, when he developed a debilitating back condition and was no longer able to support the GWG in the many ways he always did.

In addition to taking care of the club finances for over 20 years, Bob contributed so much to the life of the GWG. He personally procured, maintained, stored, and brought the audio/visual equipment, the portable tabletop lectern (which he made), and other needed items to each meeting. Also, he has been GWG's unofficial technical commentator, often correcting or contributing to points being made from the lectern.

Bob has lived on North Isabel Street in Glendale for many years in the family home in which he grew up. He is a great lover of cactus; on his front porch and along the side of the house are dozens of planters growing various cactus species, some well in excess of six feet tall. In his back yard are vegetable gardens and a garage with room extensions for several work shops. There is an unbelievable amount of equipment in these shops: metal lathes, mills, plus an assortment of related equipment, tools, and tons of drawers, boxes, and bins for parts. Bob was an avid swap meet attendee, both regular and commercial, where he bought bushels of parts, materials, tools, and machines if there was a bargain he could not resist. When he ran out of storage space in his shops and garage, he excavated an extension to the cellar under his house to store more material and parts.

Some years ago, there was a tremendous fire in one of his shops, which resulted in several hundred thousand dollars worth of damage. It took

Bob several years to recover, including over a year just to research and prepare a loss-inventory for insurance purposes. He was able to build a new and comparatively spacious shop with the insurance settlement.

Bob has a professional background in various areas of the engineering field. He was a professor at UCLA and California State University at Long Beach for 26 years. Later in his career, he was a technical consultant and was a manufacturing engineer in aerospace for a while. Ask Bob a technical question or for help with any lathe, machinery, or tool issue and you will find he doesn't hesitate to provide his expertise and assistance. He machined turning tools for me several times and did so in his usual helpful, conscientious, and skillful manner.

The only type of turning Bob does is on a metal lathe (he has several) on which he is an expert. Turning wood is a whole different matter. He often attended woodturning symposiums to learn more about woodturning, but strangely enough, applying a woodturning gouge to a piece of wood on a lathe does not seem to interest him. He does, however, admire and collects wood-turned art created by big-name professional turners and others whose work intrigues him. His collection is absolutely amazing.

In January of this year, Bob developed a crippling and extremely painful back condition, which led to several months of considerable suffering. Neither Bob nor the doctors know exactly how this came about, but x-rays show that a vertebra had chipped. The Saturday evening before our March GWG meeting, Bob had emergency surgery to remove the floating pieces of bone, which were threatening his spinal cord and nerves. Thankfully, he is now on the mend.

In appreciation for his unwavering support and devotion to the GWG, and his generous spirit, a platter was turned by Bill Loitz, upon which the GWG logo and following inscription were laser-engraved:
