CHALLENGE

The **Challenge** for April was "Colored Turnings"

The Winner in the **Beginning** Category was the "Tire Knocker" by **Craig Rovello**, made from cherry, mahogany, walnut & padauk, finished with mineral oil.

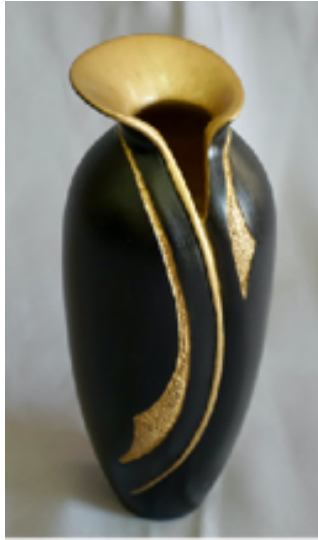


There were no entries in the **Intermediate** Category. The Winner in **Advanced** was **Scott Johnston's** platter of alder, with brass, silver & black finish.



Other entries:

Scott Johnston had two additional pieces: his "faux segmented" vessel of maple with brass & black glaze, and another maple vessel, carved and finished with black ink & brass finish texture.



After some arm twisting, **Marisa Cody** showed us her Humble Bowl of maple; stain, wax and oil finish. **Henry Koch's** plate was finished with (surprise!) dye & lacquer.



Carey Caires presented a "visible to the naked eye" piece of holly finished with gold rub, buff and acrylic paint.



Jim Schopper had an ash urn with its fourth (so far) iteration of finish of dye, black paint, silver metallic paint. **Chris Dodson's** hollow form was of purple heart, curly maple & poplar, finish with dye, OB Shine juice & wax.



Judges were: **Anton Bosch** and **Jay Reidy**

Show & Tell

A goodly selection this month:

Thomas Cassidy had a plate of maple finished with Bill's Homemade Hooch, destined to be delivered to an outgoing President of the Tournament of Rose.



Mike Toth didn't tell us what these were, so you'll have to take your best guess.:



Fernando Vilchis had a spalted maple bowl and an elm closed form, tung oil & varnish finish.



(note: the photos of these two pieces are definitely NOT to scale with each other!)

Bill Haskell's pieces: another of his parabolic shapes, and a hollow form, both of black acacia finished with Mahoney oil & wax



Learning from the master, **Craig Sobel** had his unfinished "Bill Haskell Form", while **Chris Dodson'** gave us his FOG wood bowl, OB Shine juice finish.



Klaus Schmitt's pieces were finished with lacquer: vessels of sycamore and an unspecified wood,



Another **Klaus Schmitt** piece, this one of carob, lacquer finish; and a set of nested ash salad bowls by **Charlie Hulien**, using the Oneway Easy Coring System Knife Set. Finished, with (naturally!) Salad Bowl Finish.



Our very own Mr. Dye and Lacquer, **Henry Koch**, had both winged and flightless ash bowls, and an oak lidded box.



Jim Schopper and **Bob Clark** gave us items best photographed in the landscape orientation: **Jim's** box elder bowl, with wax, chalk paint and black undercoat; **Bob's** bowl of spheres of various woods with Hut wax:



and in portrait mode, **Jim's** Box elder jug, same finish as the bowl, and **Bob's** maple goblets with a French polish.

Presentation

Our presentation on finishing was by the tag team of **Bill Loitz**, **Chris Dodson**, **Henry Koch**, and **Bill Haskell**.

Mr **Loitz**, the only presenter with a handout, led off with a recipe and instructions for making and using "Hooch", which consists of equal parts boiled linseed oil, pure tung oil (not a blend) and spar varnish. This is a multi-coat finish with repeated applications and wiping off sessions.

Chris gave us the recipe for OB Shine juice, which is a friction polish made from equal parts of denatured alcohol, Bullseye shellac, and boiled linseed oil. He recommends using this along with EEE Ultra Shine to get the best results.

Henry talked about using sanding sealer, and how many coats of lacquer are possible on a piece, along with the use of tinted epoxies to fill grain on woods like oak

Mr **Haskell**, batting cleanup, has become a fan of using Mahoney's walnut oil and wax, particularly on darker woods with nice grain contrasts. He also now prefers the Luster Lac brand of lacquer available from Vista paint as well as other sources. He also likes grey Scotchbrite abrasive for "de-nubbing" finishes.

We need ideas/wants for future presentations. Some suggestions have been basic spindle and/or bowl turning for newer members, workholding techniques (specialty/homemade chucks, etc.), Sharpening techniques for chainsaws, lathe tools (might need longer time frame for that).

We do not know at this time whether we will be able to hold actual turning demos at this new site, stay tuned...

If Internet/WiFi is sufficient at this site, we could hold on-line demos, unknown possibility at present.

Other Items

We didn't seem to have any new members this meeting. Time to recruit!
